

have received many comments about the current state of our streets, and I want to ask all of you for your patience as streets all over town are torn up with the repairs we are doing on our water and sewer lines and on our storm drains. Seasonal road repairs are also in full swing. We re-asphalt and chip and seal one seventh of our roads each summer. I realize that this can be very inconvenient as we attempt to travel around Cedar City, but they are necessary while we are enjoying our beautiful, warm summer weather.

All of our infrastructure repair jobs have been bid out and are under construction with the exception of the

storm drain on Northfield Road, which will start any day. As we hoped, the costs came in under budget, and we were able to put several of our local construction companies to work on these projects. We have sold the bonds for our water projects, and the interest rate is lower than expected. The sewer and storm drains are being financed in-house.

The firehouse at the airport is now complete, and they will be moving in soon. It will be a great addition for the protection of our citizens.

Even though our unemployment has remained about the same these last couple of months, our sales tax revenue indicates that our economy is improving. With school starting, I encourage everyone to shop local as much as possible as you are getting your children ready to return to school.

So far, this has been a great summer. I hope all of you have been enjoying it as much as my family and I have.

t was August of 1924 that Hollywood officially came to Cedar City. It opened up an unforgettable era of moviemaking in Southern Utah, and Cedar City was right in the middle of it.

Why Cedar City? First, the railroad came only to Cedar City – not to Kanab or St. George – and a posh new hotel was built by city residents and finished by the Union Pacific to accommodate the actors, actresses and crews. Second, local businessmen (and brothers), Gronway and Chauncey Parry, lured the studios to this area with photographs of the scenic splendor and promises of taking care of the needs of stars and crews alike.

The Parry brothers had explored almost all the rivers, canyons and mountain wilderness of southern Utah.

Dry weeds violate city ordinance

The wet winter and spring that made all of our yards so green and beautiful has a down side now that the weather has turned hot and dry. Our community currently has dozens of lots with dry weeds which are a fire hazard, and are in violation of Cedar City's Nuisance Ordinance.

Ordinance 25-14 states, "Developed or undeveloped lots which have weeds, grass or other growth which constitute an existing or potential fire hazard shall be abated by the owner of the property. Weed abatement compliance shall be accomplished by discing, plowing or mowing weeds within 4 inches of the ground."

If the owner does not take care of the weeds within a reasonable amount of time, the City may abate the problem and send a bill for the service to the owner.

Cedar City Fire Chief Paul Irons said, "Due to the extended fireworks season this year, we have had several grass fires due to the dry weeds on vacant lots throughout the City. If the owners of these lots had mowed their weeds, we wouldn't have had these fires. We have been lucky so far that there have been no injuries or damage to nearby homes due to these fires."

Be a good citizen and make sure your property is not a fire hazard!

Public Works Report

STREET MAINTENANCE: We will continue our annual street maintenance in August with chip sealing. The area of the City scheduled for maintenance activities includes areas south of 200 S., east of I-15 and west of Main St., and the area south of the Staples/Christensen's shopping center east of Main St. When you see crews approaching your neighborhood, we encourage you to park your vehicle in the driveway so the maintenance work can be done completely. Normal garbage pick-up will remain on schedule.

RECYCLING: Thanks for recycling. PURE Recycling's new location at 1342 W. Industrial Road (the old Coke plant). Cardboard may be taken there. Please break boxes down. Please compact all items before

disposing. Bins are emptied every Tuesday. Please do not leave any debris behind at the recycling sites.

WATER: Please remember that during these months the ground is still saturated from the winter, so there is no need to jump the gun on irrigation. There is little need to water after a rainstorm. Watering in August should be ½ inch every 3 days. Watering is to be done before 8 a.m. and after 6 p.m. Let's do our part to conserve. **AIRPORT**:We would like to remind travelers who are checking baggage to arrive at least 30 minutes before your flight in order to allow proper baggage screening to take place.

The Public Works office would like to remind you that any work done within the road right-of-way requires an encroachment permit, which can be acquired at our office at 716 N. Airport Rd.

Chauncey carried his camera in his saddle bag, photographing the magnificence he saw. Moving pictures, once filmed in front of cardboard mountains on back lots in Hollywood, were being taken outdoors, and he imagined the grandeur of Southern Utah exposed to an enormous audience through films. Boldly, they wrote to the studios offering transportation and other services to those who chose to film at Zion or Bryce Canyon or on Cedar Mountain.

They hit the jackpot when Reynolds decided to film "The Deadwood Coach," starring Tom Mix, in August 1924. It was a huge story for the *Iron County Record* to announce "TOM MIX AND COMPANY TO ARRIVE IN CEDAR CITY SUNDAY; COMPANY TO SPEND TEN DAYS AT ZION NATIONAL PARK BEFORE RODEO." Tom Mix was the greatest cowboy star of his time and a box-office success in the 1920s.

Fifty cast and crew members arrived on August 17. It had been reported that Mix and some of the "cowpunchers" would appear at the Cedar City Rodeo at the end of the shoot in early September. The company went first to Zion National Park, where filming took six days instead of the projected ten, due to the sunny weather. The company moved to Bryce Canyon. and again finished days ahead of schedule.

To the huge disappointment of Cedar City, the Fox Movie people left on August 31, four days before the rodeo opened.

Tom Mix expressed his apologies: "There is nothing I

regret more than my inability to be present at the opening of your Rodeo. It is the first time in my life that circumstances have compelled me to side step anything like a promise...in my work, I am controlled altogether by luck and circumstances. My time is not mine when I sign a contract. . . I am like a race horse and like a race horse I have no voice even in the colors I may have to wear. . . "

He lauded the community, "That which impressed me most of all was the good old time manners of the young and old. Manners which many times during the past ten years I had thought had perished from the face of the earth."

And he predicted: "We have pioneered the production business in your section much to our satisfaction and that of the director and we feel that our reports on the possibilities of your country will induce many other companies to follow. You may be sure that business will bring us back frequently in the future and that our efforts to bring public notice to your advantages will prove of more value to your people than anything we can do at the present."

Twelve months later "The Deadwood Coach" came to Cedar City's Thorley Theater. Ticket prices were 15 and 30 cents!

Almost every summer after 1924, film crews came to Cedar City where the Parrys were headquartered, even if filming took place in Kane County or Garfield or Washington. At least forty movies were made in our area and many television shows as well. More details of moviemaking are found in the book, When Hollywood Came to Town: A History of Moviemaking in Utah by BYU film

Center reminds us to keep
hydrated this summer:

If you are spending time outdoors in the summer heat, it is very important to stay properly hydrated. Every organ in your body relies on water to function properly, so it is essential to consume the proper amount of water and fluids every day.

What is the "right" amount of fluids? It's a little bit different for everyone. The guidelines provided by the Institute of Medicine recommend that adult males drink about 13 cups and adult females drink about nine cups of fluids every day. Ideally, these fluids come mainly from drinking water, though other fluids are fine. Some examples of healthy fluids are:

- Water
- Fruit
- Low-calorie and low-sugar sports drinks
- 100 percent fruit juice
- Low-fat milk

Although soda, beer, and wine are also mostly composed of water, these drinks should not be a major source of daily fluids. Frequent or intense exercise, hot climates, and illness may cause you to need more fluids.

You should not wait until you are thirsty to start drinking. By the time you feel like you are thirsty, you are already beginning to be dehydrated. It is much better to drink fluids consistently throughout the day to stay hydrated.
